I've explored the facilities pages on the NU website which further expanded my thinking about this possible renovation to include an idea to make the whole building partially solar powered, like the Electric Lodge venue in Venice, CA, near where I live. (https://

My nascent idea is to maybe launch a "matching grant" drive among my fellow student theater alums to raise the money to get the project designed, and then work with the university and alumni relations to further fundraise to get it built. I'd offer to "match" donations up to a set amount and hopefully launch this idea realistically.

Not to drop names, but some of my close friends were ridiculously successful in the entertainment business and we all did student theater together at NU back in the 70s. I'd hope to intrigue them to get seriously involved in this (can you spell N-A-M-I-N-G-R-I-G-H-T-S?:-).

I am cc-ing here Dean Adrian Randolph of the Weinberg College of Arts And Sciences, since historically, all of the seed funding for our student theater endeavors emanated from that Dean's office, back in the day. I've inquired with alumni relations about learning how to "earmark" donations to student theater in general, even if, and especially if, this ambitious idea is unrealistic.
