She is credited with adding an authentic African-American female voice to television offerings. Brock Akil has been a consulting producer for ABC's sitcom "Cougar Town," supervising producer and writer on "The Jamie Foxx Show" and writer on "Moesha."

Brock Akil and her husband Salim run Akil Productions. She wrote and co-produced and he directed the movie "Sparkle," which featured Whitney Houston in her final big screen performance. In 2018, she produced "Black Lightning" for The CW and created "Love Is" for Oprah Winfrey Network.
